pantry for many weeks to come for the families that need it.

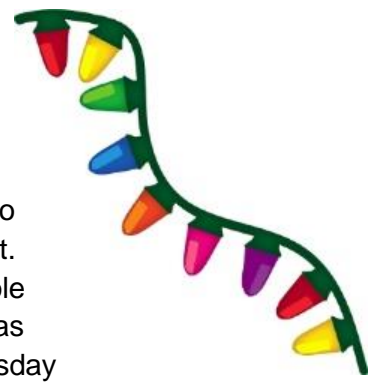

Greeting from Snowy La Crosse Wisconsin!

I moved to Wisconsin at the beginning of August and so much has happened since then. I don't know where God will take me nine months from now but I can tell you where I have been. I have worked regular shifts, done 24-hour on calls, and been sleep deprived. I have grieved with people who have lost loved ones and I have sat on the floor weeping with parents who have lost their children. In the midst of the suffering in the hospital, I have been able to laugh at the beautiful mystery that faith, hope, and life. The patients, nurses, doctors, and staff at Gundersen Medical Center have become both my colleagues and my congregation. It feels as if I have learned more from the patients than I have offered them.

The Spiritual Care department is a supportive group of clergy devoted ministering to those in need and training new chaplains. I am have become part of a diverse group of chaplain residents. Darlene is Catholic and from Laos, Linda is Presbyterian and has lived in Japan for the last 30 years, Honore is a Catholic Priest from the Congo, and Phil is Lutheran from Connecticut. Each of us brings our own gifts, personal histories, and stories of loss with us when we visit patients. When I started at the hospital, I requested to be assigned to the Orthopedic, Neurology, and Rehabilitation floors, and my request was granted! I had a strong desire to work with these patients because of my personal history with migraines and a sleep disorder and my family's history watching my grandmother experience and recover from multiple strokes.

Normally as a hospital chaplain, I am only able to visit a patient once, maybe twice before she is discharged. It has been a blessing to work on Orthopedics and Neurology since many of the patients are then transferred to Inpatient Rehab. This allows me to continue visiting with the person and their family as they heal and gain the skills needed to return home. I am able to be a friendly, familiar face as they get used to the new staff, routines, and hard work of rehabilitation. I would like to thank my church family for your continued prayers, words of encouragement and support. I wouldn't be able to do the hard work of chaplaincy without the faith and love of Pompton Reformed Church!

The Fellowship Committee

The Fellowship Committee has been a big part of my life since I was a kid. Prior to Fellowship Committee it was Friendship 52. Many people my age who grew up in this Church remember Friendship 52 because our parents were involved in it. Part of their job was to send cards and make phone calls to our members. This is where I developed my love for sending cards. I can remember as a kid sitting at the kitchen table watching my Mom writing out her cards. She always looked so happy doing this and when I asked her why she said how much people really appreciated receiving these cards and it made her happy. It was at that time I knew I wanted to feel that same happiness.

Throughout the years Friendship 52 changed and now it is the Fellowship Committee. I think of the Fellowship Committee as the heart and soul of our Church. Our vision is to care for the people who call PRC their church home. How do we care for them? We have Coffee Hour every week. When our friends line up for their coffee we always give them a cheery hello and how are you doing? Our seniors enjoy socializing with each other each week and are usually the last ones out the door each Sunday.

We usually plan a social each month. The Chili and Soup Socials are always the most popular.

Rick and Barbara Pierce chair our bus trip to Sight-and-Sound Theater in Lancaster, Pennsylvania each year. This is a way for our congregation and members of our community to come together to experience a very Spiritual play. After the play we go to Good and Plenty to have an old-fashioned Pennsylvania Dutch Dinner while sharing friendship and fellowship with one another. Other ways we share food, fellowship, and friendship is by organizing the Adult Dinner in May and organize the Church-wide picnic in September. I think you must see a pattern here now. When you think of Fellowship you think of food, friendship, and fellowship!

The Fellowship Committee oversees other events including Autumnfest. Autumnfest has been a part of PRC since the 1950's. I can remember as a kid helping out at Autumnfest. In 2010 I retired and I had heard that Nancy Porter was stepping down as Chair. I didn't want to see Autumnfest end so I went to Pastor Tom and asked him if I could take over. He said yes but he didn't want me to do it alone. He told me to bring it to Fellowship and see if they would take it on. My wonderful friends could see how excited I was about this and they said yes! This is how Autumnfest fell under Fellowship. But this is not only a Fellowship event. This is the biggest Church-wide fundraiser we have on an annual basis. Since 2011 we have averaged \$4000-\$5000 dollars a year. Throughout the years many areas of the church benefitted from the money made from Autumnfest. We have given to Missions by donating to their Mission Trips. We have given money to the Scholarship Fund. In the last several years Autumnfest money bought the new doors and the furniture in Pastor John's office. We have given towards the Roof and Furnace Fund. The Deacons participate in Autumnfest by having a Farm Stand. Whatever money they make goes into their account which helps those in need. This year a young girl from the community had a drink table and made \$200. She donated the \$200 to our Food

Pantry. Whenever we were told about an urgent need we were there to donate the Autumnfest money.

This year things have changed. We were told that all fundraiser money goes into General Fund and Consistory decides where the money will go. We were also told that we could submit a list of items or projects that we would like the money to go towards. We were then told that if there were no emergencies and Consistory agreed then the money could go to items on the list. Autumnfest made approximately \$6500 which includes the Garage Sale money this year. We had a Garage Sale because we had a lot of items left from the "This and That Shop" the year before. Rick Pierce who is our Chair submitted our list to Consistory at their November meeting. Many of the projects we submitted are not expensive and will help to beautify our already beautiful Church and also to keep us safe. Those are two very important goals if we want to bring new people in. We will let you know what the money is going towards when we hear from Consistory. We will be having Autumnfest 2020 and would like to hear your ideas on how we can make Autumnfest bigger and better than ever. We will have an Autumnfest meeting in April so start thinking of new ideas now. Please remember without all of you there is no Autumnfest!

When I say we are the heart and soul of our church this next area really proves my point. We oversee the Repast Committee. For approximately ten years Jackie Bush has given her heart and soul to this committee. Jackie will talk to the families asking them such things as how many people they expect, who is doing the catering and what time the food is to arrive, and what colors they would like the centerpiece flowers to be. We provide the coffee, tea, milk, and cups. The family supplies the food and the paper products. The committee members are a mixture of Fellowship and non-Fellowship people. The committee sets-up and cleans up. The tables are beautifully set. Once again the committee members are very caring people. Jackie is very passionate about this area and should be commended for it. The families are so appreciative for all that is done for them at this very difficult time in their lives.

Although it is not official yet, I do believe that Fellowship will be overseeing the new Communication Team which Jackie and I are Co-Chairing. This Team sends out cards to our Church Family in good times and bad. This brings me back to my childhood when I watched my Mom making out cards!

With all of the areas we oversee, you would think we have about thirty members! But that is not true. We only have thirteen members and we can really use new members and new ideas. We also have a few people who help us out but are not members. If you are a people person and you love caring for people then this committee is for you! Please think about this and perhaps one of your New Year's resolutions will be to join Fellowship!

I would like to thank the members of the Fellowship Committee for your hard work and dedication to this committee. Not only do we work hard but we have fun doing it! We also have food at every meeting which could be an incentive for new people to join! Thank you all for being my friends! The Wilsons' goal is to rebuild the church by supporting local leaders so that Cambodians can bring the gospel to all Cambodia. Deb is strengthening young church leaders and Christian organizations through training, coaching, mentoring, and prayer ministry. Mark's ministry is to love, encourage, and equip the Cambodian church and its leaders to discover, understand, and live into God's intentions for them, and to teach others to do the same.

Mark and Deb work in partnership with the Phnom Penh Bible School (PPBS), the Evangelical Fellowship of Cambodia (EFC), and the Theological Education by Extension Association of Cambodia (TEEAC).”
